Pierre Mercure (1927 - 1966) 2016 - 50th Anniversary of Death 2017 - 90th Anniversary of Birth



Pierre Mercure's music has never fallen out of performance favour, since his death in 1966. As time has progressed, new audiences have discovered his vibrant and engaging works. 




New Counterpoint Publications

Counterpoint is pleased to present the first three published works by their young and promising composer, Jacob







Plachta. This young man, all of 23 years old, has something to say, and says it in an interesting and entertaining way. This is a man to watch and you have the opportunity to learn about him at the beginning of his career.

Celebration is а piece composed for the Hannaford Youth Band, the oldest group in the Hannaford Youth Program, directed by Anita McAlister, and is the very successful training program of the Hannaford Street Silver Band, Canada's only professional brass band. Celebration is about to get its European Premiere at the summer session of the National Youth Brass Band of Great Britain, conducted by Bramwell Tovey.

Mountainscapes is for trombone and piano, written for the composer's graduation recital from the Music Program at the University of Toronto. The author was at this recital, and this was by far the most interesting piece on the program, and the rest of the program included some wellknown composers' works. At 25' Mountainscapes was the first piece on the program and it kept fact for the rest of the program, I was still thinking about what I had just heard.

Sonata for Trombone and Piano is the reduced version of the original piece for solo trombone and brass band. This was the first piece that Jacob wrote for the Hannaford Youth Band. The Youth Band has an annual solo competition, which encourages any member of the band to enter. The first round is with piano only, when 3 finalists are chosen. They perform with the Youth band in the final round. The winner then gets to play with the Silver Band on their final performance of their annual Brass Festival weekend. Jacob wrote this piece for that competition, and won first prize.

Toronto Operetta theatre has recently completed a revival of their World Premiere production of Victor Davies' and Eugene Benson's *Earnest, The Importance of Being*. The TOT did their last production in 2008. This new re-mounting is in celebration of their 30th season, directed by their General Director, Guillermo Silva-Marin.

The work is based on the familiar Oscar Wilde play, *The Importance of Being Earnest*, with clever lyrics by Benson and delightful music by Davies. The critics raved:
